ENDORSEMENT OF HEALTH REFORM LEGISLATION

“The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), which represents 60,000 pediatricians, pediatric medical subspecialists, and surgical specialists, endorses the United States House of Representatives modified health reform package introduced Thursday. The AAP applauds Congress for its steadfast commitment to passing significant health reform legislation this year.

“The House’s health reform measure, coupled with the already passed Senate bill, will help children and pediatricians. The Academy’s highest priorities in health reform continue to be: coverage for all children in the United States, age-appropriate benefits in a medical home, and appropriate workforce improvements and payment rates to allow real access to covered services. Each of these goals is addressed in the health reform package that was introduced yesterday:

- The measure will include pediatric primary and subspecialty workforce improvements, and for the first time ever, a federal commitment to improve Medicaid payment. This provision will improve Medicaid payment to a floor of 100 percent of Medicare payment for evaluation and management codes for primary care doctors starting in 2013. This \$8.3 billion investment of new federal funding over 10 years would be improved by also applying to subspecialty and pediatric surgical specialty pediatricians. Nevertheless, the provision is a historic step forward in recognizing that Medicaid payment must improve.
- All *Bright Futures* services—the definitive standard of pediatric well-child and preventive care—would be covered for children with private and public insurance as an immediate benefit with no co-payment. In addition, the essential benefits package in health insurance exchange plans will include rehabilitative, habilitative, mental and behavioral health services, vision and oral health, and other pediatric services for children. The legislation also includes a new commitment in Medicaid to expand the medical home in communities and practices.
- The measure will preserve the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) with funding until the end of fiscal year 2016 and includes a renewed federal funding commitment to states through 2019. Thirty-one million children, parents and individuals are projected to

gain insurance coverage if this measure becomes law, decreasing uninsurance in the United States by more than half.

“The Academy acknowledges that the health reform package is not perfect and there are still outstanding issues related to fair provisions for immigrant children, funding for CHIP, payment for subspecialty services, and medical liability provisions. Nevertheless, the current health reform measure contains many strong provisions for children and pediatricians.

“The Academy urges Congress to act swiftly and decisively to prioritize the needs of children and pediatricians by passing this legislation as soon as possible. We must continue to make the life success of every child our highest national priority.”
