## INAAP Awarded Healthy People 2020 Grant to Pilot NAS Program in Allen County

On Tuesday, May 23rd, the American Academy of Pediatrics announced that INAAP will be one of five chapters across the country to receive \$20,000 in funding for its Healthy People 2020 Grant proposal.

INAAP's proposal focuses on developing a standard of care for when babies born with neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS) leave the hospital.

INAAP will partner with the Indiana State Department of Health, the Department of Child Services, and the Indiana Perinatal Quality Improvement Collaborative (IPQIC) on the project. The program will be piloted in Allen County, Indiana, with the eventual goal of distribution across Indiana.

# Free Adolescent Immunizations Seminar and Fluoride Varnish Training - Friday June 30th at Purdue University

INAAP will be hosting an adolescent immunization seminar on Friday, June 30th at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana.

The seminar will address a broad range of topics relating to adolescent immunizations, with a focus on how to make a strong recommendation for the HPV vaccine. Other areas of focus will include: epidemiology, issues related to vaccine avoidance, and ways to improve compliance with vaccine schedules, discussion of vaccines in the adolescent platform, and updates on vaccines in development. Participants can earn 20 MOC part II Points and 2 hours of CME.

INAAP will also be providing an optional session on fluoride varnish. Get trained to provide fluoride varnish in your practice, and get all the information on billing and reimbursement.

# Rick Reifenberg, MD, FAAP on the Importance of Lead Screening

While lead toxicity in children is fortunately much less common than in the past, this article is a reminder to all of us that this very real problem still exists. The well-publicized cases in Flint, Michigan and East Chicago, Indiana are recent and nearby examples that we must remain vigilant on behalf of the children we serve.

Remember that lead poisoning is the #1 preventable disease condition in young children that can permanently damage the child's developing brain and other organ

systems. The AAP and CDC both agree that there is <u>NO SAFE LEVEL</u> of Lead Exposure for children.

In the 2015 Childhood Lead Surveillance Report by the ISDH (available here), the lead poisoning rates at the  $10\,\mu\text{g}/\text{dL}$  and over range have increased by 2 children per 1,000 tested compared to the year prior. Unfortunately, the overall rate of lead screening in Indiana remains very low ("7% of all Hoosier children were screened for lead poisoning in 2015" per the report).

Another concerning item recently published in Pediatrics is that in the majority of states that do lead reporting, including Indiana, it is estimated that pediatric care providers identified fewer than 50% of their children with elevated blood lead levels (defined in the study as ≥10.0 µg/dL). read more here.

The Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) mandates that children with Medicaid insurance should have blood lead screening done at a minimum at 12 months and 2 years of age. Don't assume every at risk infant and toddler is automatically being screened by WIC. If you don't have a copy of the actual lead test results (often available online on CHIRP in the left chart panel) then please consider doing your own lead screening.

An excellent resource for lead screening, including coding and billing guidance, is the online FSSA manual available here (starting on page 29). Some highlights from this source are:


- Screening for blood lead toxicity for all children enrolled in Medicaid is a federal requirement. The FSSA requires that all children enrolled under Medicaid receive a blood lead screening test at 12 months and 24 months of age.
- If the member is at high risk for lead exposure at the 6-month visit or the 9-month visit, a screening should be performed earlier.

- Children between the ages of 36 months and 72 months of age must receive a blood lead screening if they have not been previously tested for lead poisoning.
- A blood lead test result equal to or greater than 5 ug/dl obtained by capillary specimen (fingerstick) must be confirmed using a venous blood sample. Subsequent screenings are required for at-risk patients."

Children at higher risk for lead exposure include some of these:

- Children living in housing constructed prior to 1978 who may be exposed to lead pipes or lead-based paints; exposure to well water; or living near heavy industrial sites (e.g. Northwest Indiana).
- Children with a previously elevated blood lead level or with signs and symptoms of lead poisoning.
- Children with high incidence of hand-to-mouth activity, such as thumb sucking or nail biting; children with a history of pica.
- Children with poor nutritional status (increased fat, decreased calcium, iron, and other nutrients), predisposing them to enhanced lead absorption in the intestines.
- Exposure to reclaimed wood and wood products, even those that have been abated, is a new and emerging surprising source lead exposure.

Remember that all of us who provide medical care for children have the responsibility ensure lead screening has been performed when appropriate for our patients. # Formulary Update, Tips & Tricks

On Thursday, March 23rd, INAAP leadership met again with Indiana Medicaid to try and address issues with the formularies that went into effect on January 1, 2017. In addition to ongoing meetings with Indiana Medicaid, INAAP has taken other steps to try and help members navigate the new process.

First, the formularies for all four manage care providers in Indiana are now available straight from the home page of INAAP's website. The formularies will updated monthly, and should provide easier access to each list. Additionally, INAAP has posted a document detailing it's current efforts with Indiana Medicaid, as well as "tips & tricks" on how to navigate some of the specific problems that have arisen since January. The list is meant to be a "living document," and will be updated as INAAP learns new information. In Thursday, May 18th, INAAP hosted its annual luncheon at the NCAA Hall of Champions in Indianapolis, Indiana. The winners of INAAP's four annual awards were recognized, and were invited to speak to the group about their work.

The winners of the annual awards were as follows:

# The Edwin L. Gresham Award for Advancing the Care of Newborn Infants

Winner: Emily Scott, MD, FAAP

After the death of Ed Gresham, the Father of Neonatology in Indiana, the Indiana Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics thought it fitting to recognize those individuals



who make significant contributions in perinatal medicine. Nominees for this award should have

demonstrated a significant contribution to the care of newborn infants over the past calendar year.

### The Irving Rosenbaum Award for Distinguished Service

Winner: Cynthia Nassim, MD, FAAP

Each year, the Indiana Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics recognizes a physician in Indiana for distinguished service to children. This award is named in honor of Dr. Irving Rosenbaum, one of Indiana's most distinguished pediatricians. Nominees for this award should have demonstrated an outstanding contribution to the field of pediatrics in Indiana over the past calendar year. Preference will be given to nominees who have helped further issues that align with INAAP's current goals and objectives.

### The INAAP Community Service Award

Winner: Shelly King, CPNP

The INAAP Community Service Award is a means by which the Indiana Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics recognizes a person in the community who is not a pediatrician but who has made significant contributions to the welfare of Indiana's children.

### The Virginia M. Wagner Lifetime Achievement Award

Winners: Debra McDaniel, MD, FAAP and Dick Malone, MD, FAAP

First presented in 1994, this memorial award recognizes service to children over the course of a career. The award is limited to members of Indiana Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and should recognize an individual who has demonstrated continued dedication to child health issues through a variety of avenues throughout the course of a career.

As part of their visit, they met with Senator Todd Young to discuss critical health care issues facing Indiana's children.




# Reminder on the Importance of Social Media
