




Store It Safe - A New Gun Safety and Suicide Prevention QI Opportunity!

Recent statistics from The Indiana Department of Health indicate that 1 Indiana youth dies by suicide every 34 hours, making suicide the 2nd leading cause of death in young people age 10-25.

In June of 2025, the Indiana Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics (IN AAP) in partnership with the Indiana State Medical Association (ISMA), and the Indiana Department of Health is launching Store It Safe (SIS) Youth Suicide Prevention Quality Improvement Program, which empowers physicians and other healthcare professionals to identify and address the risks of suicide at encounters with patients age 12 and up. Training on using evidence-based screening tools and how to have lethal means restriction discussions with patients and families will be provided. A virtual reality platform will be used to help providers practice and learn lethal means restriction counseling techniques.

We are delighted to be partnering with the Ohio Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics (Ohio AAP) to help administer the program. Since 2015, Ohio AAP's, Store It Safe (SIS) initiative has been working to educate Ohioans about important suicide prevention strategies, including safe storage of lethal means and provide resources, including lockboxes to healthcare providers to distribute to families.

From June 2025 – May 2026, participating practices will receive:

- 25 points of MOC IV credit
- \$1000 clinic stipend
- Updated resources for families and youth
- Safety lockboxes
- iPads for efficient and streamlined data entry

CEASE is Actively Recruiting!

The CEASE (Clinical Effort Against Secondhand Smoke Exposure) program has kicked off recruitment for 2025! We are seeking pediatric practices to join the evidence based program that helps healthcare providers address household tobacco use.

Tobacco use remains a major public health issue especially in children and infants who are at a stronger risk of second and thirdhand smoke exposure. Through CEASE, clinics

receive training, resources, and ongoing support to help providers integrate effective tobacco cessation interventions into routine care. The program equips providers with the tools to ask, counsel, and treat families.

By implementing CEASE, clinics can enhance patient care, improve health outcomes, and create a smoke-free environment for children and families. Participation is **free**, and our team provides step-by-step guidance to ensure successful implementation. INAAP's Child & Adolescent Mental Health Program



The last few months have been confusing and chaotic, igniting feelings of panic and worry for many. As we continue to face future uncertainties, it is critical to identify and lean on those who provide stability, safety, and solace. This is especially important for children and adolescents who need help to process, understand, and navigate the world around them. Empowering Indiana families to prioritize mental health is more important than ever.

Indiana Mental Health Data

Per the Indiana Department of Health, all of Indiana's 92 counties experienced mental health shortages in 2023.

There were **500 people** for every **one mental health provider** in 2023 (County Health Rankings & Roadmaps).

Compared to neighboring states in the Midwest, the National Survey of Children's Health found that Indiana had the highest rate of caregivers who reported difficulty obtaining necessary mental health care for their child at 59.7%. This rate is higher than the national average of 56.1%.

The Indiana Department of Health lists suicide as one of the top three causes of death for children aged 10-19 years old. In 2022, 56 Hoosiers between the ages of 10 and 19 died

by suicide.

- Referring providers, parents, or legal guardians can complete the form below on behalf of a child or adolescent.
- Once submitted, a CARE Program Family Navigator will reach out to the family to schedule an intake session.

Option 2: Primary Care Provider Referral Form

- PCPs can use this form to refer patients when various barriers, such as access to technology or inertia prevent the family from completing the client intake form themselves.
- This referral form is designed to be brief and should take less than five minutes to complete.
- None of the fields on the form are required. Provide the information you can, and the CARE Program will do the rest!

We've got a lot of great updates to share as we head into spring. Thank you for everything you do to keep Reach Out and Read strong across the state.

Program Highlights

- 121 clinics are currently implementing Reach Out and Read across Indiana.
- We're now serving 163,173 families annually.
- Over the past six months, we've distributed an incredible 100,400 books!

We're so grateful to each of you for submitting your progress reports. This season, we hit a **95% report submission rate!** These reports are essential for helping us secure funding. Our grant writer uses this data to seek grant opportunities in your communities and across the state.

Recent Funding Wins

- \$60,000 from National Reach Out and Read
- \$15,000 from the Wabash Valley Community Foundation
- \$14,780 from National for Emergency Book Shipments

The \$60,000 from National is helping us develop our first-ever strategic plan, which is expected to be completed by September 2025. This plan will guide our next phase of growth and align with the national goal and reach 50% of children under age five by 203 here in Indiana! Literacy-Rich Spaces and Summer Reading

With summer reading programs coming up, this is a great time to connect families with your local library. Libraries often have free events, reading challenges, and resources that support early literacy. Even small steps, like a basket of books in the waiting room or posters about local programs, can help create a more literacy-rich environment in your clinic.

What We're Reading

Here are a few recent research highlights that support the work you do every day.

Turning the Page: How Shared Reading and Pediatric Partnerships Can Strengthen Early Literacy and Child Well-Being

Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) PolicyLab / Mar 25, 2025

Reach Out and Read is highlighted as a cornerstone of early literacy promotion in pediatric care, with CHOP and PolicyLab helping lead efforts to scale its impact statewide through the newly established Reach Out and Read Pennsylvania. New research supported by the Overdeck Family Foundation will examine how the model builds trust, strengthens family-provider relationships, and improves pediatric outcomes like well-visit attendance and vaccine adherence.

Early Childhood and Media: Guiding Healthy Screen Habits

Columbia Children's Health / Mar 6, 2025

Experts from Columbia University and the American Academy of Pediatrics discussed the latest research on how screen time affects children's development and mental health, introducing the AAP's new 7 C model for guiding media use. The panel provided practical strategies for pediatricians and parents, including tips for counseling families, selecting high-quality content, and balancing screen time at home.

Power of babble: Babies elicit simpler speech from adults

Cornell Chronicle / Feb 6, 2025

A <u>new Cornell study</u> analyzing parent-child interactions across 13 languages found that babies actively shape their own language-learning environment by eliciting simplified speech from caregivers when they babble. This "simplification effect" occurs across diverse cultures, suggesting that timely, responsive interactions—not just exposure to words—play a key role in early language development.

Intergenerational transmission of emotionally responsive parenting via parenting-related emotion and cognition.

Journal of Family Psychology (Impact Factor 2.3) / Apr 2, 2025

A new study has found that mothers who recalled emotionally responsive parenting in their own childhood showed greater sensitivity to their infants' distress. This link was explained by lower negative emotional reactions from the mother to her infant crying, which in turn reduced negative thoughts about the crying.
